Part 2 - Trustees' Annual report

Structure Government and Management. The Trust is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation governed by a Constitution dated 25 June 2013. Membership of the Trust is open to any individual aged 16 or over who is resident in the area covered by the Community Councils of Royal Burgh of Lochmaben & District, Templand & District and Royal Four Towns. There are currently 301 members. A minimum of 3 and a maximum of 10 Board Members/Charity Trustees are elected at each AGM. All of the Trustees must retire at each AGM but are eligible for re-election. Since 24 February 2014 a part time Project Manager, Darren Flint, has been in post.

Objectives and Activities. The Trust's purposes as laid out in the Constitution are:

- To advance environmental protection and improvement and
- To advance citizenship or community development through community ownership and management of Castle Loch, Lochmaben.

In pursuance of these objectives a dedicated team of volunteers has been established who regularly carry out a range of tasks around the Loch. Children's and youth groups have been encouraged to utilise the facilities and

appreciate the importance of caring for this important environment. A large and growing number of members of the community of all ages access the path round the Loch and this inspired more people to become engaged in the management and protection of the area.

Achievements and Performance.

Volunteering: The network of committed volunteers remains the bedrock of what the Trust achieves at Castle Loch, with over 568 volunteer hours donated (with a value of over £4915). Work undertaken by the twice monthly work parties included the building of a new bird hide, creation of new sections of footpath, improved path access by replacing bridge steps with ramps and removing kissing gates, clearing old fencing, putting in new signage and fingerposts, filling potholes and litter picking. During May 2016 the volunteers spent the month refurbishing Lochfield Cottage creating a 'pop-up' visitor centre in readiness to welcome visitors during the 2016 summer season. The Project Officer led training for 8 volunteers to run the centre.

Loch Users and Facilities: The loch continues to have a wide range of users of all ages and interests, including sailing, fishing, wildlife enthusiasts, walkers, and joggers. Walking is extremely popular as the route is accessible, flat and safe and there is an average of 1300 people undertaking the full 3-mile loch circuit each month (people counter data). This is a conservative count on the total walkers using the site for shorter or linear walks because of numerous entry and exit points. Walkers come from both the local communities of Lochmaben, Templand and the Royal Four Towns, and tourist visitors either staying in the area or passing through.

Lochfield Cottage continued to be predominately used as a base for the Project Officer and volunteer activities. The Trust started the feasibility process looking at future use and structural requirements, carrying out a public consultation. Work continues with the engagement of architects and surveyors.

A very wet winter meant much of the footpath network was flooded and impassable between December – February and Lochfield Cottage was inundated with flood waters following Storm Desmond in early December 2015.

Community Engagement: The Trust undertakes regular activities with a range of local groups and educational facilities, both on site and remotely. This includes running environmental activities at the Forest School and Kindergarten School areas in the woods surrounding the loch for children at Jaybees Nursery and Lochmaben Primary and Nursery. Lochmaben 1st Girl Guides undertook their environmental badge during weekly site visits and three Duke of Edinburgh Award teenagers from Lockerbie Academy have joined the regular volunteer party. Talks are frequently given to local and visiting adult groups such as Probus, wildlife/walking clubs and the Scotia agricultural group.

Events: The Trust runs a broad program of events throughout the summer, autumn and spring months offering something to adults and children/families, including sponsored walks, Day of the Region, wildlife walks, and painting competition.

Marketing & Promotion: One of the highlights of the year was the Trust winning the prestigious RSPB Nature of Scotland best Community Initiative award. There was also national coverage on BBC Radio Scotland's 'Out of Doors' program and regular features in the local press.

Habitat Management: The Habitat Management plan continued to be reviewed and developed, informing many of the volunteer tasks. Invasive/unwanted plants such as Himalayan balsam, American skunk cabbage, and rhododendron were cleared from various points around the site. Local botanists surveyed the grassland and woodlands recording some 120+ flora species. Links were also developed with the bryophytes (mosses & liverworts) expert from the Edinburgh Botanic Garden and over 80 species were found across the site. The British Dragonfly Society surveys the Vallison Burn area as the site is an important Scottish dragonfly site, where both the variable and azure damselfly are unusually found. The general wildlife and in particular bird populations are well monitored throughout the year and an annual report is produced by Andy Riches. The Trust are keeping a close eye on willow tit data as 2015 data showed adult populations as stable but with fewer fledgling sightings.

Part 3 - Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Castle Loch Lochmaben Community Trust

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner.
